Lectures from both national and international artist will take place Friday Saturday and Sunday. Workshops from some of today's best artist will take place Thursday June 17. A bus tour of some of the nation's capitol's incredible work in stained glass will take place Monday June 22. Don't miss this historic conference.

The American Glass Guild's Board of Directors is seeking proposals for lectures and panels from artists, craftspeople, studios, conservators, architects and historians for the AGG Conference to be held June 19-21, 2015, in Washington, DC. We are also interested in proposals for workshops on June 18th, immediately before the Conference. Please consider sharing your work, insights, and interesting projects with your colleagues.

The Conference will present papers on the many different aspects which those working in the field are faced with, including:

New Design Conservation History of the Medium Technique and Materials Business Practices History of Glass Practitioners

Accepted talks will be 20 or 40 minutes in length with additional time for questions.

Submit abstracts and workshop proposals via email to program@americanglassguild.org, attention J. Kenneth Leap, Washington Program Chair, by October 22nd, 2014. Proposals should include a title and be no longer than 300 words.

Authors must include a bio and full contact information for themselves (name/company, mailing address, phone, and email address) and, if a panel is proposed, for the other possible panel members. The program committee will send notification of acceptance by November 15th, 2014.

Instructors proposing workshops must include its expected length (e.g. 3 hours, 4 hours); all tools, materials and equipment needed for the workshop (e.g. kilns, light tables, sandblasters, paints, etc.) and who would be providing what (the teacher or the AGG); whether they expect to charge a materials fee and for what; and what the students will need to bring (e.g. brushes, drawings, cutting tools, etc).

Presenters will receive reduced registration fees. Instructors giving workshops will receive fees for the workshop, but no reduction in Conference fees. To receive these benefits, presenters must register for the Conference. All travel and hotel expenses and reservations are the responsibility of the presenter.

Important dates for those proposing -Closing date for proposal submissions: October 22nd, 2014 Notification of acceptance: November 15th, 2014

At times it felt difficult to retain all the information that was being taught, but no one was complaining. AGG Bryn Athyn Conference AGG Workshop: Design with Narcissus Quagliata AGG Workshop: Glass Painting with Williams & Byrne

When I was 12, in the refurbished country barn where my stepfather Wayne Cain has his studio, I puttied my first window. This was my introduction to the world of art glass, and I have been enthralled ever since. As my interests grew and I began taking classes with other people in the art glass community, I would hear about the American Glass Guild, and about their annual conferences. Being rather isolated out in rural Virginia, the prospect of going to a conference that was geared toward the promotion, growth, and education of the art glass community was mind blowing.

As a working artist, sometimes a helping hand is, well, helpful. I learned that not only was the AGG an organization that focused upon education, but they provided scholarship funds to help glass artists explore and expand their knowledge and abilities. I applied for a scholarship to attend the Conference held at Byrn Athyn College, and was thrilled when I was awarded one of the scholarships to attend.

My expectations, my hopes, my wildest imaginings didn't adequately prepare me for the Conference. It was so much more than what I had anticipated, and the AGG is so much more than another trade organization. This year, the conference was at Byrn Athen College, and across the street was the beautiful cathedral and museum full of what can only be described as a medieval glass admirers' heaven. Beautiful stained glass windows surrounded the lucky visitor, and we were lucky enough to be able to tour the Cathedral during the evening, to see the windows lit from the inside. Stunning doesn't begin to describe, and during other tours during the day we were able to closely examine the windows and other works of art.

One of the primary reasons I attended the Conference was for the phenomenal classes and lectures being offered. The scholarship I received allowed me to take workshops from Narcissus Quagliata

and also David Williams and Stephen Byrne. David and Stephen's workshop on a particular method of glass painting was wonderful, both men being the best sort of gentlemen and having the ability to communicate their gifts gracefully and helpfully. The class had a wonderful time painting caricatures of former kings, or perhaps lions or flowers if one so chose. Badger blenders where shared and techniques were swapped, which for me was the best part of the class.

Narcissus's workshop was on design, on how the mind and skills of the individual can be harnessed and experimented with to create a truly imaginative and expressive work of art. Almost more of a pep talk for the artist, it delved into what a glass artist needed to create a design concept that fit the client, fit the architectural, and fit the artist. He was open and warm, and answered questions about his own career and showed us design proposals from several of his projects. A brilliant man, and a what a wonderful opportunity.

Throughout the Conference there were talks being given; by artists visiting the conference, by panels of experts speaking on particular topics, and by other presenters about topics of interest to the art glass community. The guests speakers, many from overseas, were wonderful, and the information surprising. Again, as an isolated artist/craftsman in the countryside, it was so amazing to hear my own thoughts and opinions on restoration work come out of another artists mouth, or to hear the enthusiasm for glass I share be articulated by the speaker.

There were also free workshops and demonstrations offered during the conference, some on techniques, and others on more abstract topics. I was able to finally see the individuals from Bohle, thank them personally, and to watch their demonstration for their new silicone product. That theses workshops were free was just fantastic, and participation was very high. Every room was packed and each demonstration well attended.

Also on display at the cathedral were panels on display from AGG members, and they were part of a juried show, where the pieces were described and particular favorites decided upon. These works were uplifting and inspiring, and I could see myself submitting something in the future.

The auction was another highlight of the conference. There was a silent auction that spread goodies over multiple tables, and I must admit I stalked quite a few books. The live auction in the evening was amazing, and I had the opportunity to assist with that. Many beautiful panels, many wonderful books, many stunning roundels and other works of art. The atmosphere was wonderful, and bidding got intense at times.

But the true jewel of the conference for me was the networking, touching base and sharing ideas with the other artists that make up the art glass community. Sharing ideas, offering solutions, just venting about whatever was on someones mind, these conversations were what helped me realize the unique quality and character of members of the AGG; they love what they do, they love glass. This camaraderie, this shared passion for glass, was a wonderful gift I had only previously shared with my stepfather. Now I have an entire community who cares as much about the art as I do.

Overall, the experience of the AGG 2014 Conference was wonderful one, and I could go on and on, but will close with this; the American Glass Guild is a special type of organization that allows an isolated artist like me to belong to a community of other enthusiastic glass artists. Thank you so much for the gift of this opportunity, and I'll be seeing you all again next year!

Joseph Barnes (1926-2014) The AGG is sad to announce the passing of another great hero of ours, Joseph Barnes.

Joseph Barnes of Bendheim received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the American Glass Guild (AGG), honoring his lifelong dedication to the stained glass industry. Joe's career spanned over 60 years, of which almost 40 were with Bendheim. He was the first recipient

of the award, which is now presented annually as the "Joseph Barnes Lifetime Achievement Award"

"Joe's love of people and deeply rooted work ethic have made him a great asset to Bendheim and the stained glass industry," said Robert Jayson, President of Bendheim at the presentation. "Joe is known as the first in to work and the last to leave; (he) can always be relied upon to do the job, no matter what the task. I cannot imagine how many thousands of people he has helped with color selection, substitutions, shipping questions or "how-to" advice."

After World War II Joe found his first glass job at Leo Popper's, which imported specialty glass, almost by accident. He spent years learning the business under Popper's guidance. In 1969 Popper closed its doors and Barnes brought his skills to Bendheim.



In an interview Joe stated: "I love working with glass, It has charm, beauty and so many design possibilities, there is so much you can do with it. The other great part of this job is working with people. I enjoy talking to them and helping them choose their glass."

Joe witnessed Bendheim grow from a small family-owned business to a national specialty glass company with five divisions, over 100 employees, facilities on both coasts, and a New York City showroom. As the company evolved, Joe's commitment to work did not diminish.

Upon his retirement he stated: "I do not want to retire. I love the family-like friendliness and connection with people here. I do not think such atmosphere exists in companies any more. This job is my life."

Our condolenses go out to Joe's family.

Joe, you will be missed!

2014 American Glass Guild Auction Wrap-up

Thanks to the continued generosity of our members and other donors, we had another successful Auction at this year's conference! Saturday evening we closed the very popular Silent Auction tables in conjunction with our awards banquet. We had many unique items up for sale, including historical books, posters, art glass and workshop gift certificates. Over \$7,000 was raised in the Silent Auction.

The evening concluded with our Live Auction, a highlight of the conference led by seasoned auctioneer-members, Kathy Jordan and Scott Ouderkirk. They kept things lively and humorous as always! Thank you, guys! Thanks also go to Hallie Monroe, Bradford Anderson, and Daniel White who helped on the Auction floor, and to Janet Lipstreu, Rebecca Hartmann, Suzanne Leap and her kids for assisting with the very difficult task of check-out. The Live Auction brought in well over \$14,000!

In total we raised about \$22,000, more than half of which will go into our James Whitney Scholarship fund. That amount is a 17% increase over last year! Top winning bids at the Live Auction were for Sylvia Nicolas' stained glass panel (\$2,000) and the Lincoln Cathedral package, which included a facsimile panel and other associated historical pieces donated by the Lincoln Cathedral Works Department (\$1,900). Thank you! As many of you know, this fund supports members seeking to expand their knowledge of glass through workshops, classes or attending our annual conference. Stayed tuned for our upcoming announcement about scholarship application and deadlines.

As I take on the role of your President this year, I am happy to pass the baton of Auction Chair to Dan White, who will -- no doubt -- take this event to the next level.

Deadline January 15th, 2015

Our juried show this past year was a great success! Building on that success, the American Glass Guild announces its fourth juried exhibit - American Glass Now: 2015 - which will run at the Washington National Cathedral, in Washington DC. Virginia Raguin will again lead the jury.

The show is intended to give artists an opportunity to experiment, to show their skills, to be ambitious, to have a dialogue with fellow artists, and to show the public what stained glass can be.

We invite all American Glass Guild members to submit a Design Concept in the form of a drawing/sketch/watercolor (the panel does NOT have to be finished to submit a concept), along with 5 digital images representative of your work. Applicants must be a member of the AGG with all dues current.

Submissions should be sent to:

- with the words "American Glass Now: 2015"
- in the subject line by January 15, 2015 no exceptions.

All images must be digitally submitted as jpegs at 72dpi and no smaller than 800 and no larger than 1400 pixels in either direction.

Accepted artists will be notified by Febraruy 1, 2015. Panels must be completed and photographed by April 30, 2015 in order to be included in our publicity materials.
